JULY - AUGUST, 2016

Complaints about new hymns

So you think you don't like learning new hymns? See if you can guess which hymns are described in the following letters

(The <u>surprising</u> Correct Answers at Bottom)

- 1."What's wrong with the inspiring hymns with which we grew up? When I go to church, it is to worship God, not to be distracted with learning a new hymn. Last Sunday's was particularly unnerving. While the text was good, the tune was unsingable and the new harmonies were quite discordant." (Letter dated 1890)
- 2. "Was it the organist's idea or yours that our peaceful worship service was shattered by that new hymn last Sunday? The music was sacrilegious, something one would expect to hear in a den of iniquity, not a church! Don't expect me to attempt to sing it next time! (Letter dated 1874)
- 3. "Pastor, I am no music scholar, but I feel I know appropriate church music when I hear it. Last Sunday's new hymn, if you call it that, sounded like a sentimental love ballad one might expect to hear crooned in a saloon. If you persist in exposing us to rubbish like this in God's house, don't be surprised if many of the faithful look for a new place to worship. The hymns we grew up with are all we need." (Letter dated 1865)

Worship Notes from Pastor Dick:

After the Prayer of the Day, our worship service enters the second section:

THE READING OF THE WORD OF GOD

At every worship service in the Lutheran tradition, there is a reading/readings found written in the Holy Scriptures. As the Gathered people of God, we now hear the voice of God as passed down to us from the preceding people of faith. These reading are chosen from the various books of the Bible in both the Old and New Testament. The Bible was never meant to be read in small pieces chosen from here and there in God's Word. You need to read the individual books of the Bible as they were meant to be read: in one sitting. However, for the public worship of the church, it soon became a custom to read three short readings.

The First Reading comes from the Old Testament [except in the time of Easter]. One cannot really understand and/or appreciate the message of salvation in the New Testament without hearing the witness of the Old Testament. The Old Testament is the record of people of faith who are looking forward to God's keeping the promise to send a Messiah who would rescue them.


As noted above, during the time of Easter, the first reading is taken from the book of Acts telling the beginning of the witness to the resurrection and the power unleashed by God through the Holy Spirit on Pentecost.


Also from the Old Testament is the Psalm appointed to be read for a specific Sunday. The book of Psalms is the largest book in either the Old or New Testaments. It is a collection of songs of praise, confession, thanksgiving, and supplication. The singing of a psalm for a specific day of worship is an Old Testament practice which was continued by the church. As used in our worship service, the preference is for the psalm to be sung, for the Psalms are also hymns of faith.
