Pastor's Ponderings ~ March – April 2020

Okay, I admit that I'm a Hallmark Story gal. There's something about watching a G-rated, you-know-it'll-end-happy-ever-after, and there is no mind-bending plot. Sometimes a Hallmark-like movie is just the thing to relax along with a cup of coffee.

Last week I was intrigued with a movie titled, "Coffee Shop." What I believed to be typical in a movie proved me wrong. So that I don't give away the film's message, allow me to say simply, the word that remains in my mind is "belonging."

What if our sole purpose is to create an opportunity, a place, and an invitation to others to feel they belong? Is this important?

In a way, life mirrors this movie. We have a cast of characters that come into, interrupt, and even surprise us in life. What would it take to intentionally find out about them? If we offer coffee to them, do we engage with them as we ask how they like their coffee? Or might we simply make a pot, set out sugar, creamer and a spoon and let them make their own, sidestepping this opportunity for engagement? Mind you there is nothing wrong with this scenario. But...what if we take the time to get to know them, really know who they are, what's important to them, how did their lives cross paths with ours?

I'm also thinking that in order to feel that everyone belongs somewhere; who they are and what's important to them is the place to begin.

Jesus spent time observing, talking, asking and sharing. Active listening is a way to describe how Jesus engaged and interacted with folks. As people felt valued, they also felt accepted into the community of Jesus' followers.

In the church office there are several mementoes from pastors who served Salem. They each left their mark in the growth of the church. Each one reached out in their unique way to get to know people and to offer a place of belonging. One of the tangible reminders discovered in the church office is a supply of magnetic promotional cards.

They have the words, "Share the Joy...know the peace." I have seen these words imprinted on a few other items and wonder if these items were used to invite people to come and learn what belonging in Salem's faith community could mean.

To feel accepted into a group is nothing new. It is a human need. Jesus saw this need and intentionally addressed it. I'm certain the former pastors each saw this need and addressed it too.

What if we intentionally build upon their blueprints adding our own fingerprints? What opportunities are we given to ask and acknowledge the value of another person? Where might God set up an encounter to take place in your daily routine? How might we value the time given to us that in some way may make a difference in the life of another and in our own?

Jesus appears to share the joy and others came to know the peace. Might we learn through him and these words? I'd love to hear your thoughts and opportunities!

PRAYER WEAVE

Destiny itself is like a wonderful wide tapestry in which every thread is guided by an unspeakably tender hand, placed beside another thread, and held and carried by a hundred others. Rainer Maria Rilke -

Our prayers are the fabric of our community. As we pray for ourselves and for the world, we weave our trust, faith, and hope into our lives. We are knit together into the body of Christ, the church. One of the faith practices for Lent is prayer. The Prayer Weave in the Sanctuary is a way we are encouraged and experience prayer during the Lenten season.

Pr. Ellie Sanderson says that the imagery of weaving is so inviting. "It holds within it such a wealth of beauty and a deep resonance for so many gathered around our communion as one. Weaving speaks of diversity and unity, and it speaks of creativity and community." She noted that the wisdom of the Maori People speaks of a sacred thread, a "sacred interweaving between Christ and creation and the thread that never ends."

The congregation is invited to write the words of their prayers on strips of paper (cut to length and provided near the loom) with pen/pencils provided. Then weave your prayer paper together with the others already woven into the loom. As you do, remember that you are offering your prayers to God. Your prayers join those of your sisters and brothers in Christ to create the fabric of our faith.

And, the prayer weave becomes a beautiful expression of our often tangled and plain-spoken prayers, and it symbolizes the connected yet individual thoughts and feelings of believers talking with their God. On Good Friday, Pastor will take the prayers from the prayer cross and the prayers will be burned as an offering to the Lord. Let my prayer rise up like incense before you, the lifting up of my hands as an offering to

Salem's Lenten Outreach

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of Lent, a season when God calls us to reflect on the meaning of Christ's death on the cross and His resurrection. The cross, a symbol of Jesus' crucifixion, offers hope. This year, our Lenten outreach gives hope to God's people in **Cambodia** who are in need.

As followers of Christ, we will be collecting funds to purchase piglets for families who are far less fortunate than most of us are. These pigs can be real lifesavers. For example, when a female piglet matures, she gives birth to approximately sixteen offspring each year. Pigs can provide fertilization for the crop fields so they, in turn, can produce needed food. In addition, the pigs can be sold for other necessities for families to help to enhance their existence.

Look for the display that will be appearing soon in the narthex and obtain your piglet box. For every \$30 that we raise, a pig can be purchased to support this important **ELCA World Hunger Appeal**.

This outreach opportunity runs from **Ash Wednesday**, **February 26**, **2020**, **through Easter**, **April 12**, **2020**. Please consider giving generously.

The Lord replies, "A minute."


