

An Easter Cookie - "It is risen!"

Easter Story Cookies
(To be made the evening before Easter)

YOU WILL NEED:

whole pecans	1 cup
vinegar	1 tsp.
egg whites.	3
pinch of salt	
sugar	1 cup

Also needed:



1 zipper baggie, wooden spoon, masking tape, Bible

- 1. Preheat oven to 300 degrees. (This is important; don't wait until you're half done with the recipe!)
- 2. Place pecans in zipper baggie and beat them with the wooden spoon to break into small pieces. [After Jesus was arrested, He was beaten by the Roman soldiers. Read John 19:1-3.]
- 3. Smell the vinegar. Put 1 tsp. vinegar into the mixing bowl. [When Jesus was thirsty on the cross, He was given vinegar to drink. Read John 19:28-30.]
- 4. Add egg whites to vinegar. Eggs represent life. [Jesus gave His life to give us life. Read John 10:10-11.]
- 5. Sprinkle a little salt into your hand. Taste it and brush the rest into the bowl. [This represents the salty tears shed by Jesus' followers, and the bitterness of our own sin. Read Luke 23:27.]
- 6. So far, the ingredients are not very appetizing. Add 1 cup of sugar. [The sweetest part of the story is that Jesus died because He loves us. He wants us to know and belong to Him. Read Psalm 34:8 and John 3:16.1
- 7. Beat with a mixer on high speed for 12-15 minutes until stiff peaks are formed. [The color white represents the purity in God's eyes of those whose sins have been cleansed by Jesus. Read Isaiah 1:18 and John 3:1-3.1
- 8. Fold in broken nuts. Drop by teaspoons onto a wax paper-covered cookie sheet. [Each mound represents the rocky tomb where Jesus' body was laid. Read Matthew 27:57-60.1
- 9. Put the cookie sheet in the oven, close the door and turn the oven OFF. [Place a piece of tape on each side of the oven door to

- represent that Jesus' tomb was sealed. Read Matthew 27:65-66.1
- 10. GO TO BED! There may be a feeling of sadness to leave the cookies alone in the oven over night. [Jesus' followers were in despair when the tomb was sealed. Read John 16:20 & 22.]
- 11. On Easter morning, open the oven and remove the cookies. Notice the cracked surface of the cookies and take a bite out of one of the cookies. The cookies are hollow! [On the first Easter, Jesus' followers were amazed to find the tomb open and empty. Read Matthew 28:1-9.]

Since our last congregational meeting was held, Salem Lutheran provided 68 casseroles for the months of December, January and February. This means that in the first quarter of our church year at Salem, participating members provided a nourishing meal for 544 people. throughout the world. The gifts of livestock, like the goat, provide people with food to eat and drink, fertilizer to grow crops and offspring to sell on the market which provide funds to meet daily living expenses. The goats allow impoverished families to become independent so that they do not have to rely forever on handouts. In fact, those who are actually

helped through our gifts, are soon able to support others who are in need within their local communities.

When we give, as disciples of Christ, we're also

sharing the Good News. Through our sacrificial offering, we're providing the opportunity for non-Christians to be exposed to the Word of our Lord.



So, if you are able and you have not yet donated, may your heart be moved by the Holy Spirit to give to this important Lenten outreach opportunity. *
